Biography

Loren Adler

Loren Adler is Associate Director of the USC-Brookings Schaeffer Initiative for Health Policy, a partnership between Economic Studies at Brookings and the University of Southern California Schaeffer Center for Health Policy & Economics. His research focuses on a range of topics in health care economics and policy, including insurance markets, provider payment, prescription drugs, Medicare, and the Affordable Care Act. Previously, he served as Research Director for the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget and as a Senior Policy Analyst for the Bipartisan Policy Center. Adler received his bachelor's degree in mathematical economics from Wesleyan University and his M.S. in Applied Economics from Johns Hopkins University.

Jack Hoadley

Jack Hoadley is Research Professor Emeritus in the Health Policy Institute of Georgetown University's McCourt School of Public Policy. He retired in 2017 but continues to conduct research on a part-time basis. In 35 years as a health policy researcher, he has studied a wide range of health financing topics focusing on Medicare, Medicaid, and private health insurance. His main area of research currently is state and federal consumer protections around surprise medical bills. Other recent papers have addressed the Medicare Part D drug benefit; access, costs, and coverage for prescription drugs; Medicaid coverage for children and families in small towns and rural areas; and the impact of provider concentration. Dr. Hoadley served six years as a commissioner on the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission (MedPAC) from 2012 to 2018. He holds a Ph.D. in political science. Prior to arriving at Georgetown in 2002, he held staff positions at the Department of Health and Human Services, MedPAC, the Physician Payment Review Commission, and the National Health Policy Forum.
