





- **Dukes Memorial Hospital** (Peru, IN) Only places to provide this service in the county
- Parkview Dekalb (Auburn, IN) One only places to provide this service in two counties
- Parkview LaGrange (LaGrange, IN) One only places to provide this service in two counties
- Parkview Whitley (Columbia City, IN) Closing its family birthing center and relocating it to the new Parkview Kosciusko Hospital (30 minutes away)
- **St. Vincent Dunn** (Bedford, IN) The last hospital to provide this service in Lawrence County

Mrs. Wilkinson

- 26-year-old Taysha Wilkinson-Sobieski passed away on October 12, 2023 from a "ruptured ectopic pregnancy and its complications" after being transferred from Parkview DeKalb to Parkview Regional Medical Center... The DeKalb Labor and Delivery Unit closed just week before and had no staff to care for her.
- In 2021, the Indiana Department of Health identified 37 Indiana counties that had no inpatient delivery services.

Recommendations from Commonwealth Fund to Increase

- 1. Extend and provide support for evidence-based implementation of Medicaid's postpartum coverage to 12 months.
- 2. Promote policies, innovative payment models, and digital tools that support the continuum of reproductive health care from family planning, abortion services, and maternity care to postpartum and well-woman care.
- 3. Provide funding to community-based organizations focused on advancing maternal health outcomes and addressing racial equity.
- 4. Expand and diversify the maternal and reproductive health workforce by investing in teams of physicians, midwives, doulas, community health workers, and maternity care coordinators.
- 5. Invest in care models that support mothers with maternal mental health conditions and substance use disorders.
- 6. Increase financial investments in social determinants of health that influence maternal health outcomes.
- 7. Continue to prioritize the elimination of racial inequities in maternal health.
